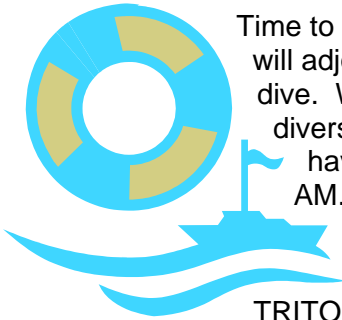

- **\$8.6 million:** The project cost — nearly four times the original 2001 estimates because of delays and higher-than-expected cleanup costs.
- **19:** The number of agencies that required permits before the ship could be sunk.
- **Four:** The number of 8-ton

anchors that secure the ship.

- **1999:** The year the Vandenberg came out of retirement briefly to co-star with Jamie Lee Curtis and Donald Sutherland in "[Virus](#)," a Universal Studios film about a ship possessed by alien life forms.
- **80,000:** The number of man-hours that the cleanup required to remove: **1 million gallons** of oily water; **184 55-gallon** cans of paint chips; **46 tons** of debris; **180 cubic yards** of marine growth; **100 gallons** of hydrocarbons; **385,529 pounds** of PCBs (mostly from electronic instruments and wiring); **81 cubic yards** of asbestos; **300 pounds** of mercury; and **800,000 feet** of wire. The sanitization alone took **85 percent** of the project budget.

We did have half the pavillon for the day, it worked great. Nice area that is under shade and out of the sand, perfect for picnicking.

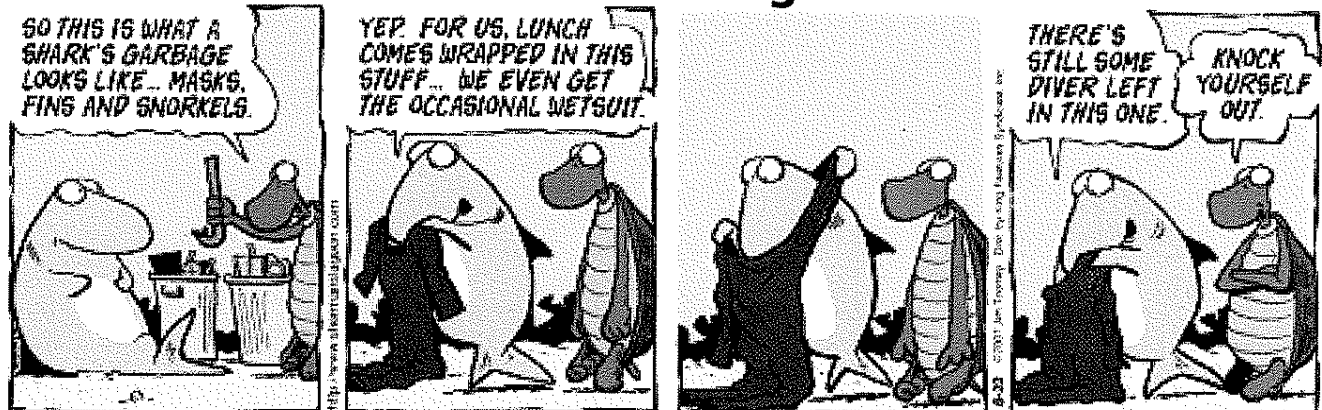

Sherman's Lagoon



Editor's Note: The following is my review of a new movie, about one of the world's most disturbing problems - over-fishing and the future health of our oceans. If you get the chance I would recommend you see it. Many thanks to Dave and Rosanna Vemmer and Chris Demski for the input to this article.

THE END OF THE LINE

Imagine a World Without Fish

I was fortunate to attend the screening of the movie, *The End of the Line* recently at Facets Multimedia. This movie subtitle is *Imagine a World Without Fish*. It reveals the devastating effect that global over-fishing is having on fish stocks and the health of our oceans. It details the fishing industry, the excesses of some of the participants and the lack of enforcement in establishing and policing quotas. How "trawling" devastates the Coral etc by going under the ocean floor and pulling up everything in its way. Therefore destroying the Beauty we now can see but in the future will not be there. The movie warns that the oceans will be out-fished by 2048. Modern fishing is too efficient and is catching more and more fish –the fishing boats may be fishing for a specific type of fish but also catch ones they don't want (simply thrown back but are usually dead or dying). *The End of the Line* is not against fishing. It is not against eating fish. But it is for a responsible attitude towards the oceans. The film has three messages for consumers, citizens and companies:

- Ask before you buy: only eat sustainable seafood.
- Tell politicians: respect the science, cut the fishing fleet
- Join the campaign for marine protected areas and responsible fishing

They hope that when people buy fish in a shop or in restaurant, they will ask where it comes from; whether it is from a sustainable source, whether it is an endangered or over-exploited species. We can make or break the future by how we choose to spend our money and explain to any who will listen why we chose what we do. There are useful guides to what fish you can buy with a (fairly) clear conscience. The Monterey Bay Aquarium issues one. You can go to: www.SeafoodWatch.org or to the Shedd's website - they have a wallet card: http://www.sheddaquarium.org/pdf/Shedd_08_Right_Bite_card.pdf.

But they also want people to put pressure on politicians to listen to the scientists and act upon their recommendations. Write to your Senator and representative.

And, finally, join the campaign to make more of the oceans protected areas, where industrial fishing is not allowed and where fish stocks can replenish themselves. At the moment only 3 per cent of the world's oceans are marine protected areas. You can learn more about why they should be increased and those who are campaigning for them, they are listed on the movie's website, www.endoftheline.com, see [Organisations](#).

- One billion people rely on fish as an important source of protein. - WWF
- An international group of ecologists and economists warned that the world will run out of seafood by 2048 - Washington Post
- As many as 90% of all the ocean's large fish have been fished out. - WWF
- One per cent of the world's Industrial fishing fleets account for 50% of the world's catches - CNN
- Government subsidies of over \$15 billion a year play a major role in creating the world's fishing fleets.- WWF
- The global fishing fleets are 250% larger than the oceans can sustainably support.- WWF
- Only 0.6 per cent of the world's oceans are designated as protected.- WWF
- In 2004, 13,000 new marine species were discovered, according to the Census of Marine Life. - Census of Marine Life
- Japan has caught \$6 billion worth of illegal Southern Bluefin tuna over the past 20 years. - Australian Broadcasting Corporation
- Over the past 50 years World consumption of tuna has increased tenfold, from 0.4 million to over 4 million tons. - Environmental Justice Foundation
- Fifteen species of sharks have seen their numbers drop by 50% in the last 20 years. - [National Geographic](#)

WHY DO FLAMINGOS STAND ON ONE LEG?



Why do flamingos like to stand on one leg?

Two scientists who conducted an exhaustive study of captive Caribbean flamingos believe they have the answer, the journal *Zoo Biology* reports.

To regulate their body temperature.

Or, in science-speak: "We demonstrate a negative relationship between temperature and the percentage of observed birds resting on one leg, such that resting on one leg decreases as temperature rises," comparative psychologists Matthew Anderson and Sarah Williams, from Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia, write. "Results strongly suggest that unipedal resting

aids flamingos in thermoregulation." The birds also likely alternate which leg they stand on to avoid one leg becoming too cold, the BBC [says](#), quoting Anderson. "If they stood on one leg consistently, they would risk greater loss of body heat and potential tissue damage in the cold," says Anderson.



WORLD DIVING RECORD BROKEN

Nearly 3,000 divers set a world record Sunday for the largest group dive by plunging into the famed waters of Bunaken, North Sulawesi.

The information center of the Sail Bunaken 2009 committee said 2,818 people participated in the event, but only 2,805 people stayed underwater for at least 25 minutes. That is the minimum length of time required by the Guinness Book of Records, whose representatives were on hand to witness the new record.

"Divers began entering the water at 8 in the morning. By midday, all of them had returned to shore," Koesdiantoro of the Sail Bunaken 2009 committee said.

The mass dive also marked Indonesia's Independence Day, August 17. An Indonesian flag will be unfurled underwater tomorrow as part of the independence celebrations.

Sail Bunaken is a government-sponsored festival designed to promote Manado, and the visually rich waters of Bunaken, as an international tourist hotspot.

Indonesian Maritime Affairs and Fisheries Minister Freddy Numberi, who also heads the festival committee, said Manado had seen a spike in economic growth thanks to Sail Bunaken.

"The growth is temporary, but it has given the people of North Sulawesi a chance to learn how to develop their local potential," he said.

- 3) **DIVERS MUST REMAIN IN BUDDY TEAMS.** Only one prize per pumpkin. Each member of the buddy team may want to carve his/her own.
- 4) **NO TIME LIMIT.** However carving must be completed during one dive.
- 5) **DESIGNS MAY BE DRAWN ON PUMPKIN PRIOR TO THE DIVE.** Bring a Sharpie
- 6) **PROPS OR ATTACHMENTS ARE ACCEPTABLE, BUT MUST BE ADDED UNDERWATER.**
- 7) **INTERFERING WITH ANOTHER BUDDY TEAMS PUMPKIN(S), WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION.**
- 8) **WEIGHTS MAY BE PLACED IN THE PUMPKIN TO HOLD IT DOWN.**
- 9) **DIVE KNIFE OR ANY OTHER TYPE OF CARVING TOOLS MAY BE USED.** Bring whatever you need.
- 10) **IF YOU PLAN TO ENTER THE CONTEST, YOU MUST HAVE YOUR PUMPKIN(S) ON THE JUDGING TABLE BY NO LATER THAN 2:30 P.M.**

FINAL NOTE: You must take your pumpkin(s) home with you! These are the rules . . . If you want to change them, we invite you to host the event next year. Then you can make up your own rules, and the rest of us will be happy to follow them! CRUISE SHIP HOOKS FIN WHALE

A threatened species of whale in Canada was found dead and firmly wedged against the bow of a cruise ship following its arrival from Alaska.

The fin whale was found wedged to the Princess Cruise Lines' Sapphire Princess ship, which docked at Canada Place on Saturday morning.

In a news release, the cruise liner said that it is unknown how or when this could have happened, as they have strict whale avoidance procedures in place when our ships are in the vicinity of marine life.

The adult whale was an estimated 70 feet long, according to Lisa Spaven of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

It was wedged on top of the bulbous bow, the part that cuts through the water.

The whale's fin and part of its body protruded from the water as tourists watched from Vancouver's cruise ship terminal.

The fisheries department will need to conduct a necropsy in order to determine if the ship actually struck the whale while it was alive or if the whale was floating dead at sea and then got caught in the bow.

CORAL SPAWNING A HOPEFUL SIGN

The first-known spawning of Atlantic-Caribbean, nursery-raised staghorn coral has been reported in Key Largo, Florida Keys.

Secondary-school students from the Tampa Bay area involved in the SCUBAnauts International program have been working with marine scientists at Molasses Reef to collect gametes (cells that fuse together during fertilization) produced by the farmed coral. The project is said to be a significant breakthrough, because it proves that staghorn corals cultivated in nurseries can reach sexual maturity and help to rebuild reefs naturally.

Staghorn corals are classified as "threatened" in the USA, but are often the building blocks of reefs in Florida and the Caribbean. The staghorn gametes collected by the students will be used in laboratory fertilization projects, with the objective of producing offspring that can be transplanted.
